one in mind, but I wanted to tell you  
that my not saying anything more about it  
meant anything but indifference; indeed, that  
I felt very anxious about it. ~~Also~~, [I gather  
that just now is the time these things are  
being settled; and I shall be very glad to have  
my case settled one way or the other]. As  
you once said, if I get anything it will be on  
my record of service. ~~With~~ Fletcher and  
Deary at the Dept. I have felt that  
there would be friendly cooperation at that  
end and that there was no use of my  
agitating the matter any more myself. D
