To the Editor of the Herald-Tribune New York, N.Y.

My dear Sir,

A moderate duty on tea, coffee and chocolate would seem ideal for balancing the budget with a good margin of Safety: and it should appeal to Democrate as a customs duty "for revenue only" in accord with Democra tradition, and to Republicans as a depression-proof sour of revenue. Consumers need suffer little, if at all, fo they can easily return to buying in bulk, or a cheaper grade and so resist having the tax passed on to them in higher prices. It is my impression that the duty on cof was abloished about a half century ago in the name of th political cry of "The Free Breakfast Table"; that the pr failed to go down; and that the revenue was simply lost the Treasury and added to the profit of the middleman. much as the sorely needed liquer revenue now goes to the bootlegger instead of the Treasury.
