To the Editor of the Herald-Tribune:

We pay salaries to our police force and we buy them their clubs and revolvers. We know that ^Britain and the British fleet are the only police force that protects us, our only sure defense. Besides paying this indispensable police force nothing, should we ask them to buy, or borrow from us the weapons with which they defend us as much as they do themselves?

The sooner the war resources of the English-speaking peoples are pooled, the sooner America will be on the road to safety. If there must be bargaining, let it be for mutual use of bases and harbors throughout the world.
