Dear Mr. Wilson:

I want to thank you for your letter which I received sometime ago at the time when you were leaving for an extended trip. I would like very much to talk to you in the near future and will be glad to drive over to Woodbury to see you if you will indicate what time would be convenient. I think that I can tell you an interesting story regarding the political situation in this state. There are so many angles to it that any information given in a letter could only be confusing, but I will say that I believe that there is a unique opportunity for establishing a really progressive party here and of assuring its dominance in the state government.

At the present time the governor is about to name members of various commissions and heads of some state departments. I would like to know whether or not you would be interested in any sort of appointment which will give you an opportunity for public service. I have no definite suggestion to make but you might be willing to give me your general opinion of this idea.
