Dear Sirs,

On my way north in late April I plan to stop in Philadelphia and ask for an interview in order to discuss with you the question whether some of the matters I am disposed to write about might perhaps make suitable articles for the Post.

Meanwhile I submit herewith (with addressed and stamped return envelope) an article on foreign policy. The subject seems to me extraordinarily timely just now. In order to bring it within the compass of a magazine article I have, as you will see, been compelled, naturally, to touch only the main points and considerably to compress them as well as the background of the thesis.

I feel somewhat qualified to write on this subject because of my sixteen years in the diplomatic service and the Department of State, and because all my life I have been a student of political and economic affairs.
