I remember everything well enough; but thinking of those days made me realize how much I should enjoy a meeting and a chat with you again. I have lived here in the country for nearly seventeen years. If you are ever in this region do stop and see us. I think old friendships take on new value as one grows old. If you feel this, let us make sure of a meeting one of these days.
