May 11, 1909.

My dear Dr. Eccleston:

We were distressed to learn that by moving about from house to house in such a dizzy fashion we had missed a visit from you. We are now permanently settled at 1608 K Street, and whenever you are in Washington I do hope you will look in and see us.

As to the Liberian matter, I shall be at your disposition at any time to discuss it, but the fact is that we have sent our commission to Liberia largely for the purpose of gathering information and I dare say that upon their return about the end of June we shall be able to give you much more satisfactory information than it would now be possible to give. Meanwhile, whenever it will be convenient for you to come to Washington please fix a date in advance and give us the pleasure of coming to luncheon with us.
