July 21, 1942 The Honorable Lloyd C. Griscom Syosset, L. I., N. Y. Dear Griscom. I have long intended to write to congratulate you upon the great success of your book "Diplomatically Speaking". I now heartily do so. I am getting gradually (now perhaps two-thirds) through writing my own reminiscences. In looking over my material I came across several delightful letters you wrote me, from the United States and from Brazil, which I will send you, if you would like to have them. They brought home to me the staunchness of your friendship in those ancient days. Growing old makes one, I think, value old friendships and old recollections. I think the last time I chatted with you was at the Metropolitan Club in Washington at the end of World War No. I. If we are to meet again, we must perhaps not delay too long. For about seventeen years I have lived here in the country, happily and definitely married (the long-distance record). If you and your wife ever come to this region, do look us up. I should much like to see you again; and I hope you may have a similar feeling and that it can be managed somehow. With kind rememberances, and every good wish, I am Very sincerely yours, F. M.
