My dear Sir,

We all agree that the issue being debated at Washington is a vital one, and I feel sure that you concur in the view that the embargo must be repealed and the United States must return to true neutrality under international law.

I am disturbed at the seeming attitude of the Connecticut delegation in Congress. Senator Danaher seems aligned with the "isolationists"; and, so far as I know, none of Connecticut's representatives has taken an unequivocal stand for repeal of the embargo.

I am writing earnestly to request you to consider the enclosed argument and to use your great influence to cause the Connecticut delegation to take, on this vital question, the position which is so evidently called for by the interests of our country.
