
My dear Mr. Huntington-Wilson,

Thank you so much for your re-print from the Herald Tribune which I have already read with very great interest, and one hundred per cent approval.

Perhaps you saw my little note in which I stated that our only interest was "Do we want England and France as neighbors, or do we want Hitler and Stalin? For as sure as the Allies lose the War, Germany will take the British and French West Indies and probably Newfoundland and Vancouver." I added that one of the important generals of the last War had said to me only a few weeks ago that he would rather fight them with the British and French Armies and Navies than fight them alone.
