My dear Mr. Wilson:

I have received your letter of April 16th and note what you say that you hope in the course of the next two months to have the four sections of your proposed pamphlet completed. I understand also that you would be quite willing that I should include in my own section something on mental hygiene, and of course the other sections naturally would touch also upon general and moral hygiene to a considerable extent perhaps. In reply I will say that if nothing happens I hope to prepare a tentative paper and submit it to you in the course of the next two months or soon thereafter. I put it in this way because I have many pressing claims on my time and attention during the next two months.
