


"The Progressives propose merely to submit a constitutional amendment at some future date and after opportunity for adequate public consideration, which shall answer the question : shall they be ruled by a bare majority of the Supreme Court? The proposed amendment will not deprive the Supreme Court of any power whatever specifically conferred upon it by the Constitution of the United States.

"The false statement also is being spread that this proposed amendment, if adopted, would deprive the Supreme Court of power to pass on the Constitutionality of acts of State Legislatures and that it would imperil fundamental rights, such as are involved in the Oregon school case and the Nebraska case.

"I say that statement is false. The proposed constitutional amendment will not in any way affect the power of the Supreme Court, except as rerelated to acts of Congress. It will not in any way restrict the power of the Court to pass upon the acts of State Legislatures."
