



"THE STATE FORESTS OF PENNSYLVANIA."

"The State Forests of Pennsylvania, Bulletin 37 (revised)" has been issued by Joseph S. Illick, State Forester of Pennsylvania, a copy of which has reached the office of THE INDEPENDENT. The excellent publication contains much information indicative of the great and important work that has been achieved in the reclamation of the forest lands of the State by the Department of Forestry at Harrisburg. After more than a quarter of a century of acquisition work, the State Forests of Pennsylvania contain 1,132,444 acres. This vast forest area was purchased at the average price of \$2.26 per acre-perhaps the very best investment ever made for the people of Pennsylvania. The forests are located in the mountainous parts of the Commonwealth where most of the land is adapted primarily to the raising of successive growths of forest trees. Under State administration more than 2000 miles of roads and approximately 2,700 miles of trails have been developed through the forests, the boundary lines of which have been cleared, posted, painted, and otherwise marked so that their location is definitely fixed. There are numerous cosy hunting and fishing camps in the forests, placed there by hunters and fishermen, under State restrictions. In years to come the lumber product of these forests will be enormous. State Forester Illick deserves felicitation upon the issuance of Bulletin 37 (revised).



CONVERTING STRAW INTO DOLLARS.


Dr. Sydney D. Wells, connected with the U. S. Department of Agriculture Laboratory at Madison, Wisconsin, has, after much experimenting with wheat straw, perfected a process whereby the straw, after being cooked in a large cauldron and combined with certain chemicals, can be formed into thick "rigid" boards of great structural strength that are virtually perfect insulation to heat, cold, or sound. It is reckoned that much of the wheat straw now going to waste throughout the West will thus be utilized and made the source of revenue to farmers.
