## FOOTBALL

### RESERVES 6, READING H. S. 3

Last Saturday at Reading the Reserves added another victory to their list, defeating Reading High School in a closely contested game by the score of 6-3.

In the first period Snell kicked off to Bransome who ran the ball back ten yards. Wiedorn, on the first play, carried the ball through right tackle for a five yard gain and the Reserves gradually forced their way down to the home team's thirty yard line where the Reading lads recovered a forward pass. Snell immediately kicked out of danger and the first period ended with the ball in the Reserves possession in the middle of the field. In the second period however our boys were not to be denied and after a series of tackle runs interspersed by an occasional line buck. Mumfer carried the ball over the line for our only score. Bransome kicked an easy goal. Snell then kicked off to Jacobs who ran the ball back to midfield. Here Reading recovered the ball on a fumbled forward pass and for a few minutes completely took the Ursinus aggregation off their feet. By brilliant end runs and an onside kick they carried the ball to the Reserve's five yard line where they fumbled. The ball rolled over the line and Captain Herber fell on it for a touchback. In the second half Reading succeeded in carrying the ball to Ursinus' thirty five yard line at which point Snell dropped back and kicked a pretty field goal against a high wind. In the fourth period the Reserves gave a fine exhibition of open play and only the call of time prevented another score. For Ursinus Gilliland and Mumfer excelled, while the centre playing of Young for Reading was easily the feature of the game.

**EDITORIAL**

The annual report of the officers of the College has just come from the press and is ready for distribution. Every student of Ursinus should procure a copy of this pamphlet and become acquainted with the true situation at the College. The reports, on the whole, are encouraging and reflect great credit upon the men who have guided the affairs of Ursinus during the past year. Various improvements are noted, all of which prove that we have indeed entered upon a new era. A Greater Ursinus has long been the goal towards which those interested in the College have been striving, and at this time it seems that we are rapidly nearing that goal.

During the period of time covered by the recent reports we have grown materially along all lines. We have improved in our educational work by adding to our curriculum, the merits of which have long been recognized by the leading educators of the State. The report of the Treasurer shows the finances of the College to be in a far more stable condition than has been the case during previous years, although a deficit is in evidence. Numerically we have made a substantial gain, the class this year being the largest that has ever entered Ursinus. Thus we see that the present administrative staff has performed its duty well in the striving for a Greater Ursinus. It is now "up to us," as students, to fall in with the work and render all possible aid. Not only should

we strive to maintain and raise the moral and intellectual standard which we have acquired, but we should contribute our material support as well. We wish to see Ursinus open her doors to a class of one hundred freshmen next fall, and should accordingly start at once to canvass for new students. We have many opportunities for doing this work among our friends at home and should not hesitate to recommend our institution to any one, for it is a recognized fact that the standard of learning at Ursinus is equal to all, and surpasses many of the colleges of our size. Let us then do our part in working for a Greater Ursinus.

To-morrow the football team plays our ancient rival, Haverford, uniting athletic relations which have been severed for two years. The last game played was in 1907 when they defeated us by the small score of 6-0. The team went over to Haverford that day confident of victory but after a long and fierce struggle our boys were forced to bow in defeat to a team which was faster and more aggressive. This year Haverford has a team which, although somewhat lighter than ours, is very fast and aggressive. They always play like demons on their home grounds and without a doubt the game will be hotly contested from beginning to end. This game has always been one of the big games if not the big game on our schedule as well as on Haverford's. Certainly they will have a large crowd there to cheer on their team, to victory if possible and to defeat if necessary. There should also be a large crowd of Ursinus adherents at the game to cheer their team. Every student who has the means (and sometimes if the means are not at hand they can be gotten without much difficulty) should be on hand to see the game and help along his or her team. Remember it is one of the biggest games and bound to be one of the hardest fought games of the season, so come to see it.



Rev. Bawden took for his subject "What all the World's a-seeking," and brought out the following points in his talk:

All the world is on a hunt for something. We are all one in heart and follow the general laws of nature, so every conscious being is seeking and longing after something. That this is true is proved by evidence from two sources:

1. From facts of our inner life. Behind all endeavor is a dream, a hope, a longing—always, is there an inner vision. We are seeking something outside ourselves.

2. From our outward life. Men are following all lines of activity—what for? Some, it is true, for daily bread, but there are others who have all that is necessary for the present and future, and yet they strive. They seek something. "There is in all humanity a lust for life." The man or woman who is following the inward call is going to be successful. There are three phases of life that are sought after: (1) The sense of life, (2) The intellectual life and (3) the spiritual life. The latter should be given the right of way.

Finally analyzed there are two objects of search in this world,—(1) love and (2) power. A man is never at his best until he has found the love of God and answers His call. When he has found this love he will hunger for the power to lift others. When this is done you will have found what all the world is seeking.
