# TOO MANY SURPLUSES?

In radio reports, the newspapers, and private conversations we hear much of the "theory of surplus." Too much grain, vegetables, fruits, a great unused surplus of second-hand autos. Everywhere around us we hear the theories of surplus, limited production, and other more or less practical ideas, being compounded. In the light of Webster's definition of surplus, ie, "That which remains when use or need is satisfied," many of these theories crack down before a whole lot of common sense is applied.

If, then, there is too much of too many commodities there seems to be two ways out . . . to curb the production or to lend impetus to the buying power. Curbing the production hits a vulnerable spot in the ranks of the employed and leaves something yet to be desired. On the other hand, any theory that purports to add buying power must, of necessity, rest upon the foundation in fact that we will pay a premium in prospective good times of the future in order to have some ready cash in today's collective pocketbook. This, too, leaves uncertainty and fear in our minds and—a surplus of national debt.

Looking again to Webster, however, we cannot conceive of a surplus in this great nation of ours. Whatever our hopes or fears for the future may be we must look forward to a period when production will rise again. The need is here and all that we need is a common sense attitude toward our economic problems. Governments and individuals alike, must learn to exist on less during lean periods. Other nations have gone "broke" trying to peg the markets for grain and commodities. That is an historical fact. We needn't worry about surpluses as yet. What we need is a practical method of alleviating any discomforts until such time as the need gets so great as to force industry to move with greater activity. And that time will come—we will learn C. H. S. Honor Roll and yet that nothing has as much power to move something as does public opinion.
