#### DRAFT BOARD WAIVES RULE TO ACCEPT GEORGE BOYER 243-LB. PEN GUARD CONSCRIPT

Probably the biggest one-man addition to the United States army is that of George W. Boyer, of Philadelphia, a guard at the Eastern Penitentiary at Graterford.

Boyer, conscripted in Montgomery County Draft Area No. 8, is six feet tall, and weighs 243 pounds. Listed as eighty-three pounds over-weight, he was admitted by a special waiver of rules when the examining physician declared that he was "all muscle, with not an ounce of excess flesh on him".






