David L. Tyson, 75, of Limerick, was struck and almost instantly killed by an automobile as he walk ed across Benjamin Franklin highway just above Limerick at o'clock Tuesday evening. The aged man suffered a fracture of his skull, multiple compound fractures of both legs.

A Pottstown youth, Earl Missimer, 20, of 434 Walnut street, was arrested and held under bail, pending action of the Coroner, on charges of involuntary manslaughter as the alleged driver of the car which struck Tyson.

Missimer, according to police, was unable to explain how the accident occurred. He was traveling east on the Benjamin Franklin highway while Tyson was walking from a son's garage on the north side of the highway to the south side where he was living with the son.
