



Like the potato shortage last spring, the present butter shortage smells bad in the light of the official government figures which reveal that the country's warehouses held 209,000,000 pounds as of August 1—while one year ago the figure was 91,000,000 pounds. Could somebody be holding back to force up the ceiling price?

We took out our potatoes last week and beg to report that our spuds were very nice—what we got; but we got less than half of what we should have because of the dry weather. An average of two potatoes to a stalk doesn't fill the basket very fast. The yield should be ten bushels for every bushel planted.


