EDITORIAL COMMENT

#### School boards all over the country are currently working on a number of consolidation projects which would materially reduce the number of individual school districts operating school buildings independently.

We know that at least several of our nearby township boards are Lawn Mowers Sharpened-Repaired considering or have considered the advisability of allying themselves with present junior-senior high schools in the area.

While we are generally opposed to the general trend of taking school matters out of strictly local hands it must be considered that there are certainly advantages of several contiguous districts combining to form a larger board for the operation of such junior-senior high school units as are needed.

Collegeville-Trappe has just completed the erection of a new wing to the high school building. The additional facilities make this one of the most attractive and modern school buildings in a wide area. Certainly it is to the mutual benefit of both the two local boards and other districts in the area to

consider an alliance for the operation of the unit. Outside districts which are now operating the primary grades to the eighth year or less cannot logically operate a township high school on

their own. They could, however, be invited into the Collegeville-Trappe system with impunity. All districts involved are better off for the union if it is done on an equitable basis.

For such union makes for a school which is better able to present a wide curriculum with a minimum number of instructors.

Lower Providence, Upper Providence, Skippack and Limerick townships are, at this moment, not allied with any other district. These people are close to the Collegeville-Trappe school center.

Local districts should welcome the opportunity to participate in the operation of a school in which they have sent large numbers of tuition pupils. In turn the two boroughs here could well welcome the outside districts for the added services which would be made pos-

It is unlikely that such a union would be possible during the current year but we should like very much to see one or several of the outside districts invited to discuss a possible merger for the mutual benefit of students, the towns and townships and for the "forgotten man" of today, the taxpayer.
